Plant late in the month	1 Best planted as seeds in single cell seedling trays or planted out as seedlings grown in single cell seedling trays to minimise root disturbance.					* Key vegetables only, not all vegetables that can be grown are shown. # Broccoli, cabbage and cauliflower can be planted in spring for summer cropping but will be prone to attacks by cabbage butterfly caterpillars, for this reason such plantings are best carried out by experienced gardeners using varieties specifically bred to handle summer conditions.
